Public Health is an exciting and expanding health field dedicated to promoting health and preventing disease. Public health focuses on societal and political issues that impact the health of all people, not just the individual.

Public health promotes health and the prevention of illness through:

- Health policy development and regulation
- Disease research
- Health education
- Diagnosing, monitoring and investigating illnesses
- Empowering communities
- Evaluation of health services
- Linking people to personal health care services
- Ensuring an expert public health work force

Public health focuses on PREVENTION of illnesses. Traditional medicine focuses on TREATMENT of illnesses.

**There are five main academic fields that lead to a career in public health:**

- 1) **Biostatistics** - Study and apply statistical methodology to address public health issues.
- 2) **Epidemiology** - Study how disease and disability spread or are contained.
- 3) **Health Policy and Management** - Study how health services are delivered to populations.
- 4) **Health Education/Behavioral Science** - Study and implement practices for creating a health-educated populace and government.
- 5) **Environmental Health** - Study how the environment affects human health.

Bachelor's degrees and joint degrees (ex. MA/MPH) are also available.

Some schools offer a public health major (the UO does not); however, any major can lead to a public health career. Aim for a well-rounded curriculum of sciences, social sciences, and humanities. Here at the UO there are several Planning, Public Policy, and Management (PPPM), Sociology, and Anthropology courses that have an aspect of public health education that could benefit students interested in pursuing a public health career. Developing strong written and oral communication skills is also important in this field.

## **Experience:**

You must also have some experience before applying to a graduate program in public health. Listed below are some opportunities to get experience in the public health field:

### **Peer Health Internship**

The UO offers an excellent, competitive peer health internship program. Peer health educators attend two terms of health and public health courses for graded credit and staff the Peer Health office in the UO Health Center. Peer Health educators also gain skills through creating and providing workshops, presentations, health marketing and writing health articles to UO students. For more information see:
